"TOUCH-TASTIC" DISPLAY BY WALES IN EDINBURGH

Wales Touch Association retained the European Championship Trophy after some exceptional displays of skill in winning the men's, women's and runners up in the mixed event at Edinburgh over the weekend of the Championships.

The first day of competition started early for both the men's and women's open and it was clear from the early stages that competition was going to be tough for both categories.

The men's team started their campaign with a win against Scottish 4-0 in an ill-tempered game. The foundations however were set for a battle with the old enemy England. The team did not appear to be firing on all cylinders and at the end of the game scores were level at 3-3.

With two games left in the round robin the team welcomed their encounter with Canary Islands as they came away as convincing winners 8-0. The Spanish team could not cope with the organised attacking strategies of a bonded Welsh team. During the last game Wales went down 2-1 to the surprise package of the whole tournament - Jersey.

Running alongside the European Championships was a "Rest of the World" invitation event with teams from Australia, Natal, South African and a Great Britain Colonial teams.

In the women's open the Welsh team had to face the Southern Hemisphere teams as well as the European contingent. In the early encounters the well-drilled Welsh team went down narrowly to Colonials and Australia 3-1 and 1-0 respectively.

The first European match of the group was against England and the team won convincingly 3-0. The Welsh ladies then went down 3-2 to a South African side full of very experienced touch players.

The remaining European Cup matches were all important to the Welsh team with only the top two in the group playing off for the final. A 3-2 win against Jersey and a convincing 5-0 win against hosts Scotland, placed the Welsh team at the top of the European Cup group.

With the men's and women's events nearing a conclusion, the sun appeared and the crowds started to mass. The atmosphere was building with the Welsh contingent providing immense vocal support. The Welsh men were now on the big stage and proved to be far to well drilled for their English counterparts.

Gwion Kennard scored two well executed tries to assist with the convincing victory by 5-0. In the other semi final, Scotland proved to be the surprise winners against the now favourites, Jersey.

The ladies final was set with Wales facing old enemy England. It wasn't long before the Welsh team moved up a gear and started to make some ground, driving the ball well through Alison Eves, Rachel Parsons and Natasha Mathews.

It was Pip Thornhill who crossed the scoreline first diving to score. Wales started to pull away with further touchdowns from Rhianon Thomas and Parsons. England pulled out all the stops and scored just before half time.

In the second half Wales moved the ball around with ease and further touchdowns from Parsons and Thornhill seemed to put the game out of England's reach. The English team weren't, however going to give up without a fight and clawed a further touchdown back; at the final whistle Wales clinched the first event 5-2.

The atmosphere was bubbling as the Welsh men moved forward to face Scotland in the men's open final. It was the Welsh men's captain Russell Thomas who showed some exceptional pace and skill to put Mike Nicholas over for the first touchdown.

The Welsh team looked full of ideas as they moved up a gear executing some well-executed moves. A further touchdown for Wales scored by Ian Worgan, and a return for Scotland meant the score at half time was 2-1. After the turn around Wales came out

with a bang and touchdowns from Mathew Burns and Richard Thomas enabled Wales to scoop the second event 4-1.

With the first day over Wales Touch teams proved to be a formidable force in the men's and women's divisions.

The mixed event commenced the following day and expectations were high after the earlier Welsh success.

The initial round robin match placed Wales mixed team against Jersey. After failing to capitalise on some early opportunities the Welsh went down 1-0. A fast turn around saw the team then face an enthusiastic England team.

Despite some fine displays of driving play from experienced campaigner Dean Kidd the team went down 5-2.

In the following game everything seemed to click into place for the Welsh side in the battle against Canary Islands, and at the final whistle the side cruised to victory 7-0. In the remaining pool game Wales put up a fine display to convincingly beat Scotland by 5-2



The semi finals were set and Wales were again to battle it out against England. At half time the scores were even at 3 tries each. Only a few minutes into the second half Mark Jennings found some space and raced fifty yards to score, this was the last score of the game and Wales came out on top 4-3. In the other semi final Jersey cruised to an easy win against Scotland.

The final was set and after an exceptional start Wales went ahead in the first three minutes leading by 2-0 through scores from Kidd and Neil

Perkins. The Jersey side however fought back and at half time the Jersey side were ahead 3-2.

Wales pulled a touchdown back at the start of the second half thanks to Non Evans. After injuries to Clive French and Huw Laugharne the Welsh team struggled with the speed of the Jersey attack, at the final whistle Wales went down by 6-3.

Cary Thompson the President of the Federation of International Touch stated, " It was great to see that Touch was developing so well throughout Britain. Wales have held onto the European Cup after some fine displays of Touch. The future co-hosts of the bi-annual European Cup will be Wales in 2002"



Neil Perkins a Development Officer with the Wales Touch Association stated "It was a fabulous weekend for Wales Touch. We were the only nation in the European Cup to have separate men's, women's and mixed side, which shows how strong the game is in Wales".
